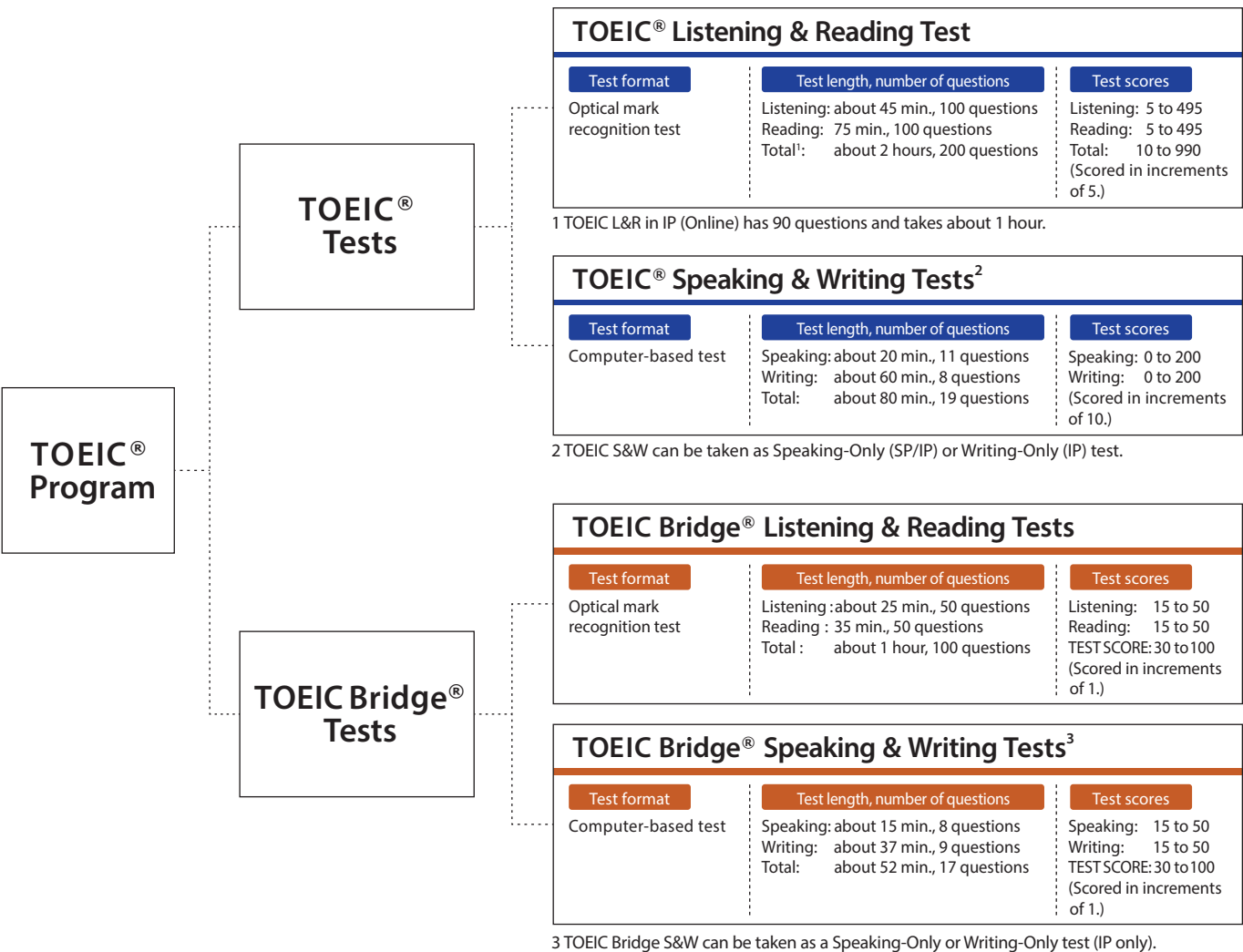

The TOEIC® Program consists of TOEIC® Tests and TOEIC Bridge® Tests.

TOEIC® Tests are the global standard for assessing English language skills needed in the workplace and daily life. All four skills (listening, reading, speaking, and writing) of English communication can be measured through TOEIC® Listening & Reading Test (TOEIC L&R) and TOEIC® Speaking & Writing Tests (TOEIC S&W).

TOEIC Bridge® Tests are global common standards targeting beginner- to intermediate-level English language learners to assess their ability to use English in daily life. All four skills (listening, reading, speaking, and writing) of English communication can be measured through TOEIC Bridge® Listening & Reading Tests (TOEIC Bridge L&R) and TOEIC Bridge® Speaking & Writing Tests (TOEIC Bridge S&W). They are recommended for those who want to learn English from the basics or want to effectively prepare themselves before taking the TOEIC® Tests.

All tests are used globally. The TOEIC® Program is administered in 160 countries, by about 14,000 companies and organizations. In FY2025, the TOEIC Program was administered in around 3,900 companies, organizations, and schools in Japan.

Secure Program (SP) and Institutional Program (IP)

The TOEIC Program has two test-taking systems: Secure Program (SP) and Institutional Program (IP). The SP is taken at a time and place specified by IIBC, whereas the IP is taken at a time and place chosen by a company, organization, or school.

Official Score Certificates and Digital Official Score Certificates will not be issued, but results (scores) of SP and IP are equivalent to the certificate. 5. Business days include the day of the test, the day when the test materials are received, and the day when the test is completed, but exclude Saturdays, Sundays, public holidays, and the New Year holidays (also ETS closing days for TOEIC S&W and TOEIC Bridge S&W).

• TOEIC Bridge L&R test score average: the sum of test scores divided by the number of test takers

• TOEIC S&W and TOEIC Bridge S&W score average: the sum of scores of each test divided by the number of test takers

• For IP , data includes only test takers who completed both the Listening and Reading sections, and had their tests scored (pages 6-9)

TOEIC® Listening & Reading Test



TOEIC L&R measures English listening and reading skills used in daily life and global business.

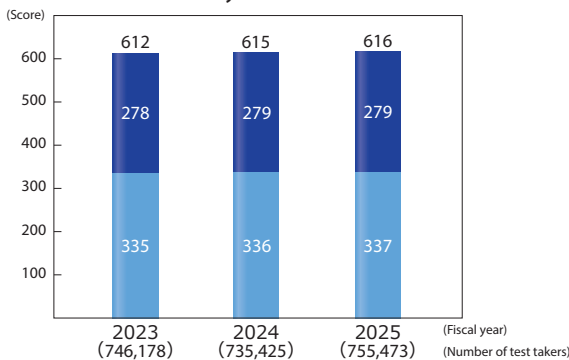
TOEIC L&R is used by companies to measure the effectiveness of their personal development and English training programs and to evaluate the English skills of new employees. Companies also use the test results to evaluate the skills of employees before sending them overseas or to see if the employees meet the requirements for career advancement and promotion. Schools use the tests to check the proficiency levels of students and measure the effectiveness of class instruction. They are also set out as requirements for entrance examinations or course credits.

The evaluation standards of TOEIC L&R are kept constant. This allows test takers to see their improvement in English proficiency by repeatedly taking the tests. That is why TOEIC L&R is widely used for a variety of purposes.

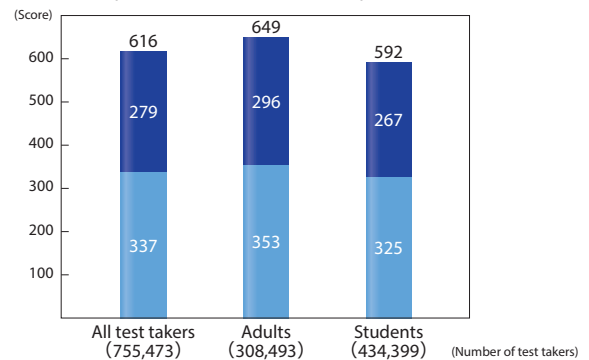

I-1. Number of test takers and average score in the last three years

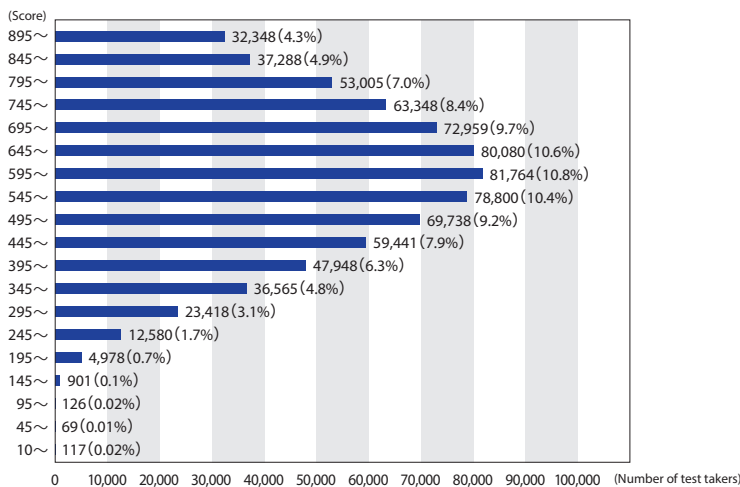


I-2. Number of test takers and average score (adults and students)

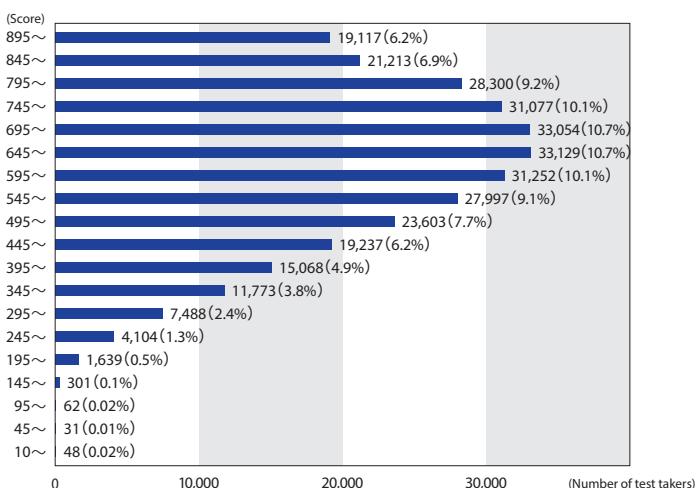

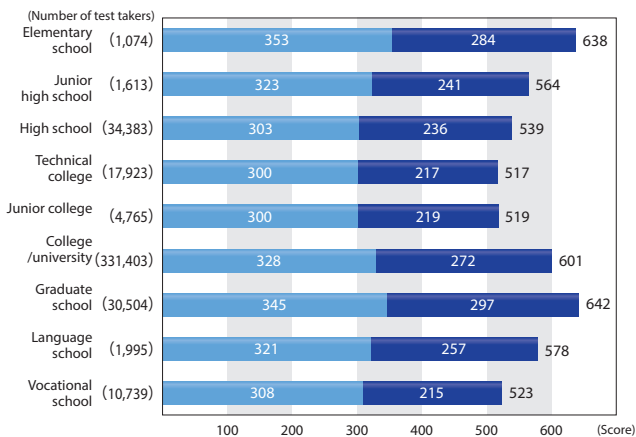

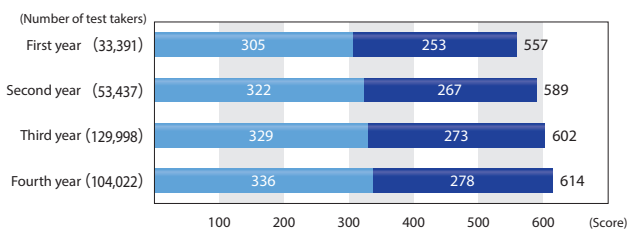

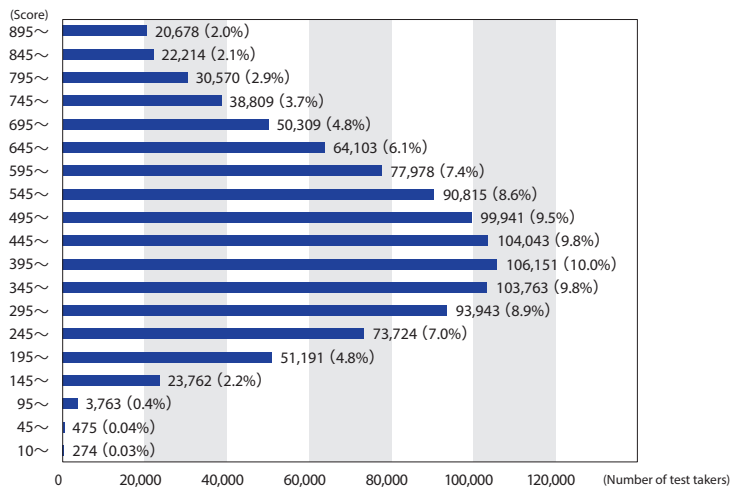

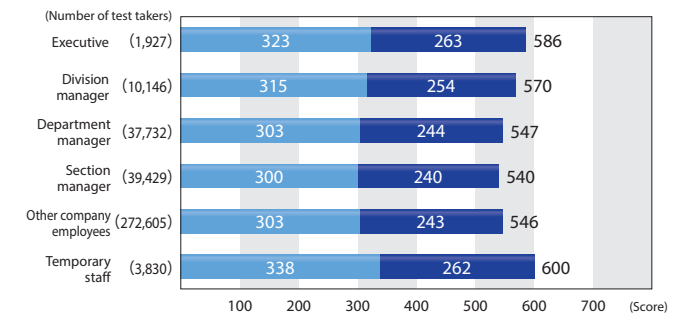
V-1. Number of adult test takers and average score by industry



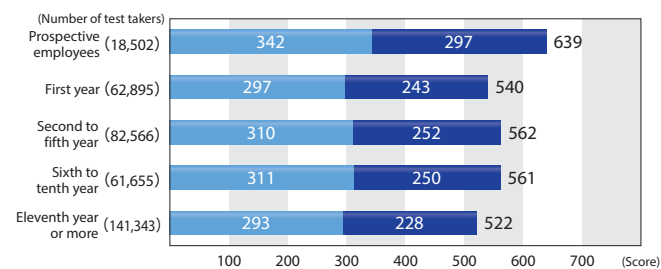
V-2. Number of adult test takers and average score by profession

TOEIC® Speaking & Writing Tests



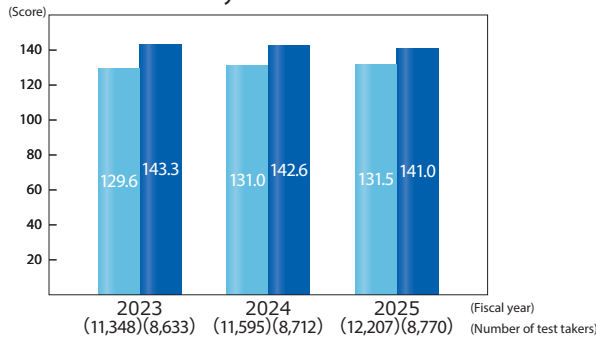
TOEIC S&W measures English speaking and writing skills used in daily life and global business.

TOEIC S&W is used by companies to evaluate English skills of prospective and new employees, the effectiveness of their training programs, and the eligibility of employees who may be sent overseas. Schools use TOEIC S&W as a tool to evaluate course teaching or study abroad programs, to do grading, and to assist students in their career development.

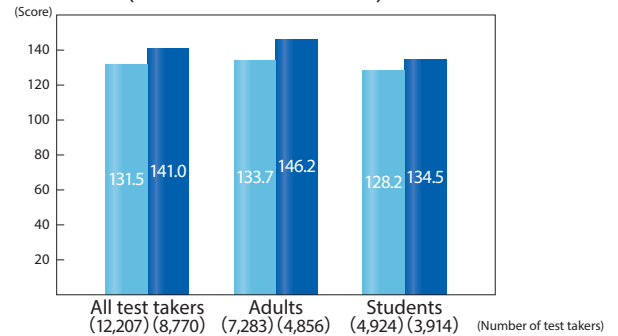

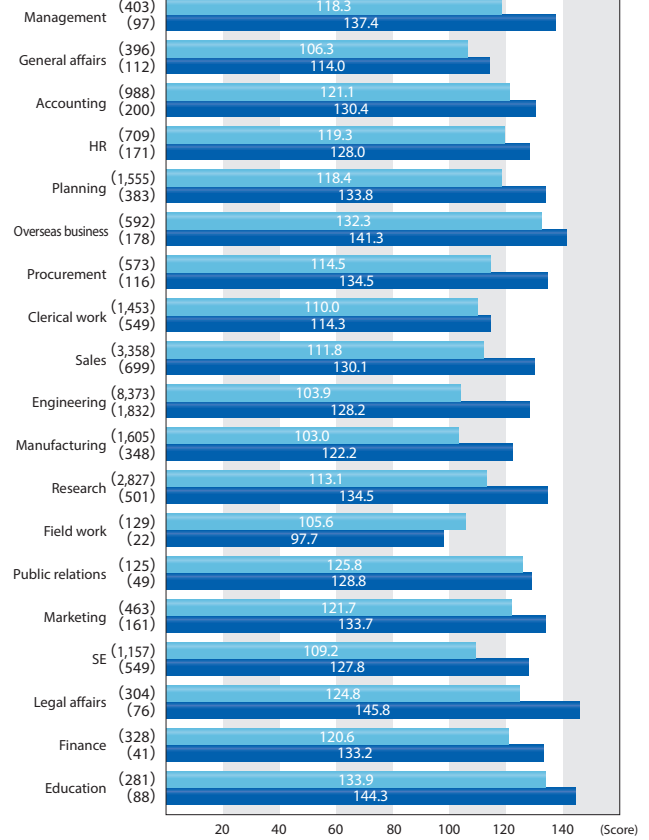

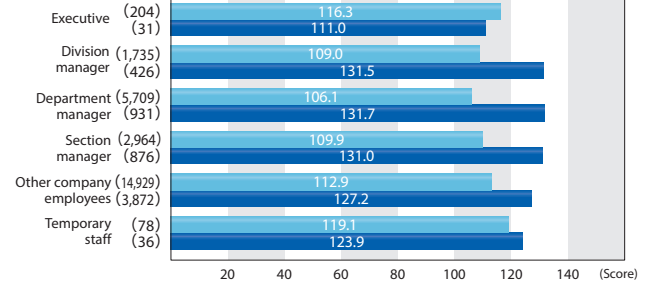
V-2. Number of adult test takers and average score by profession

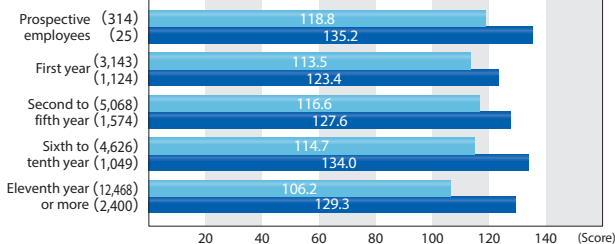

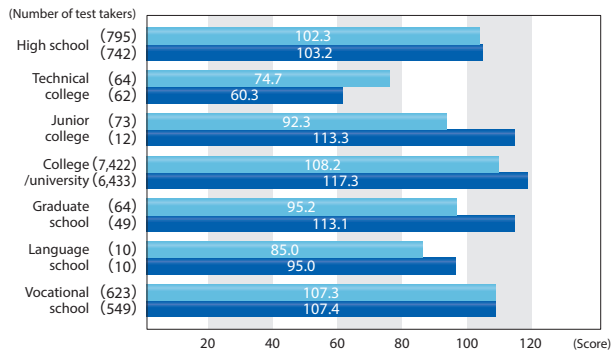

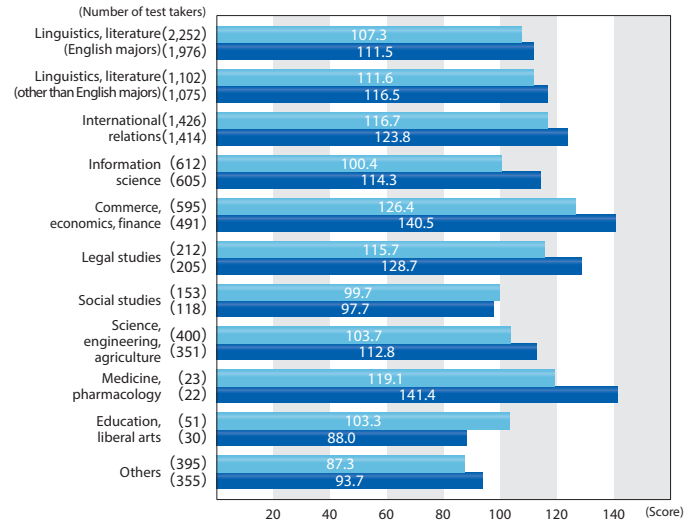

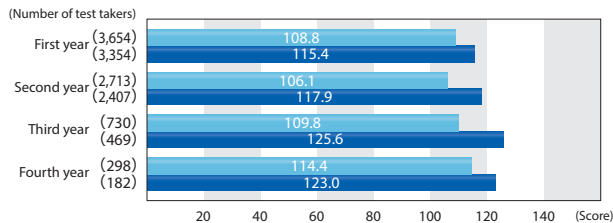

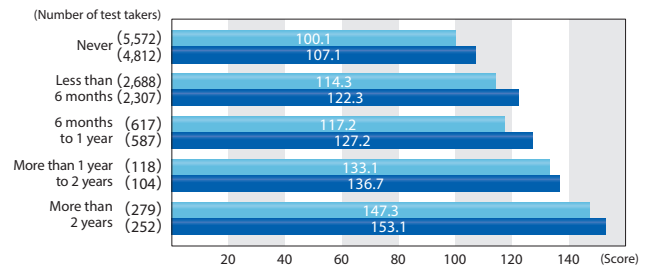

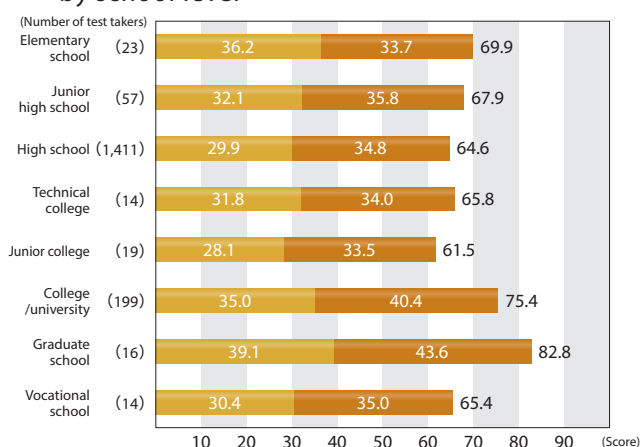

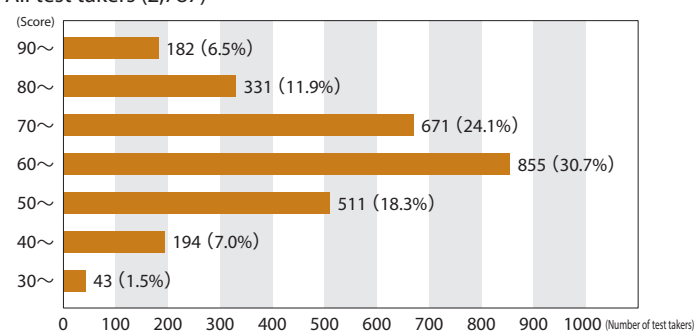

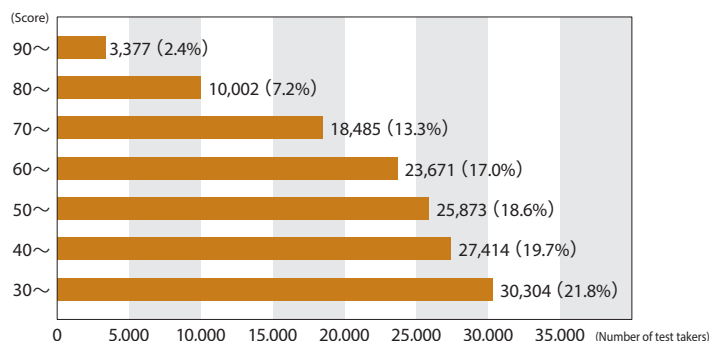

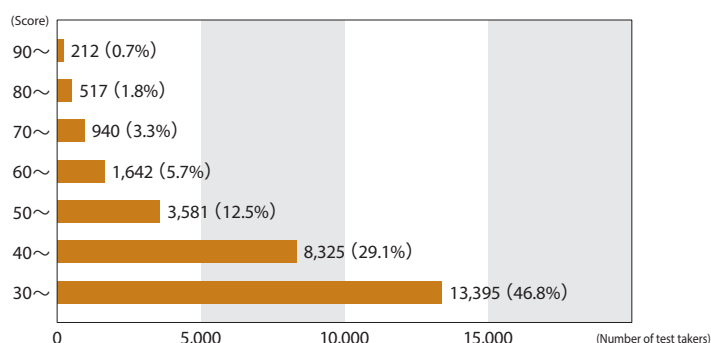

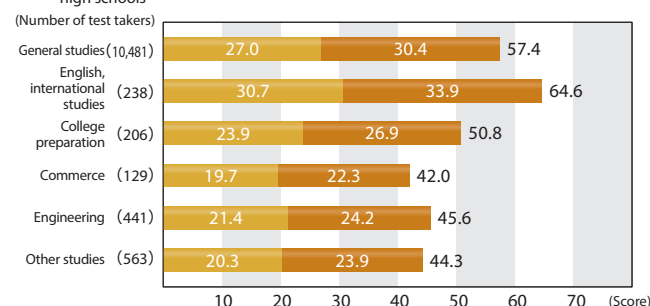

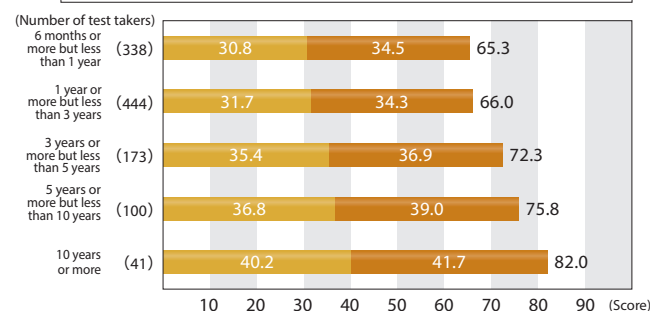

CEFR was developed in Europe as a guideline for proficiency levels of foreign language learners. It is widely used in countries in Europe and America.

TOEIC Bridge Tests are designed to measure English proficiency levels equivalent to CEFR A1 to B1 (among the six levels from A1 to C2).

Note 1. CEFR is an abbreviation of Common European Framework of Reference for Languages. The framework was developed to create common criteria to properly evaluate linguistic abilities in response to the greater mobility of human resources in Europe.

Note 2. The figures show the lowest TOEIC Bridge Tests score for each CEFR level.

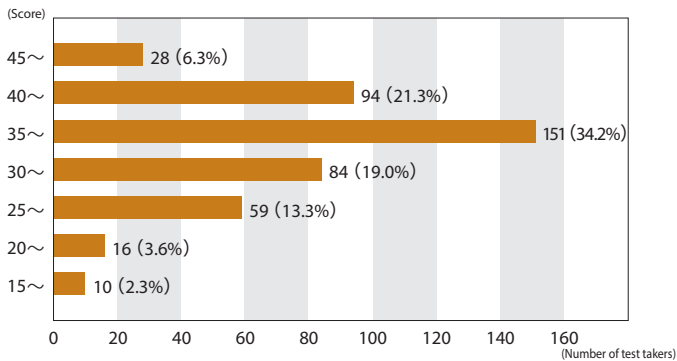
